We work to advance call #14 by supporting the revitalization and preservation of Indigenous languages in our programs, #80 by honouring and recognizing Residential School Survivors with public commemoration, and #83 through collaborative arts projects that contribute to reconciliation.

#### **Curator's Statement**

#### Tracey Kutschker

In partnership with Elaine Holmes, secondary art teacher at SAS Jackson, I created a youth curatorial course to run concurrently with Art 10 in the Sept 2024 - Jan 2025 semester. The goal was to engage students to connect with other creative students and the wider community to advance youth-guided social issues through visual art. Seven students enthusiastically signed up, and working in three groups of two and one solo curator, created four distinct thematic exhibitions within the Art Gallery. I met with the students weekly, developing their socially-relevant themes, creating strategies to engage other artists, teaching a variety of installation techniques, and helping them build a plan to install and market their exhibitions. They have each learned a set of skills that can be applied in many other creative industries.

Their exhibitions are presented to you here: Purple Paths (exploring the emotional and cultural significance of the colour purple), I Am Not Scared of Fear (exploring fears and phobias), The Weight of Absence (exploring grief and loss), and How Art Resonates with Emotion. As the Art Gallery's Curator, it has been my pleasure to pass along some of what I've learned to the younger generation. Curating for a community requires relationships, communication, curiosity, and risk. While it takes years to develop all these skills, these students showed an understanding of the behind the scenes work required to make their ideas a reality. It was a pleasure to get to know them, and to see them manifest these exhibitions for us to enjoy.

#### **Purple Paths**

#### **Curated by Gemma Green**

Purple Paths is an exhibition inspired by the many different meanings and emotions associated with the colour purple. This amazing colour can prompt harmony, peace of mind, and can be a powerful link between the spiritual and physical worlds; between thought and activity. It can bring an air of sophistication or luxury. It blends red and blue in a way that makes it both stimulating and calming. Historically, purple has played a significant role in science, history and social movements, symbolizing status and authority in many parts of our past. In more recent times, it has taken on more powerful symbolism in feminism and the women's suffrage movement, being used to portray femininity in a more mature sense. Purple is inspirational, and I hope viewers also find it to be an uplifting experience.
